which have always cooked enough food for unexpected guests—just in case. Or I could tell you about the car


that carried us into the mountains, summer after summer so that we could breathe again. That's part of where I'm from.

You and I aren't really strangers after all.



Philip said to him, "Come and see." 47 When Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him, he said of him, "Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!" 48 Nathanael asked him, "Where did you get to know me?" Jesus answered, "I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you." 49 Nathanael replied, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" 50 Jesus answered. "Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? 




